
I am really looking forward to celebrating my first Christmas in the Parish of Marysburgh! It is such a joyous time for us as followers of Christ as we gather with thankful hearts to praise the Christ child in carols and in the Eucharist. It is also wonderful to gather together to share our love for each other and to commit ourselves anew to loving the world God so loved and loves.

A father sound asleep was awakened by the small voice of his little girl that penetrated the stillness of the night. "Daddy, I am scared" Out of his groggy, fuzzy state he replies" don't be afraid, Daddy is right across the hallway" After a brief pause the little voice is heard again," I am still scared" to which the father thinking he had the perfect reply said, "You do not need to be afraid God is with you". After a bit longer pause the voice returns" I do not care about God, I want someone with skin on"

The little's girl's logic illuminates the meaning of Christmas. When we gather to worship Christmas Eve we will celebrate the amazing truth that the best way for God to demonstrate His love for us was to put skin on. God in the baby Jesus became one of us, heard our cries and came into our room. As Hebrews describes it, Jesus is not a word from God but is actually the divine Word.

It is through Jesus that we truly learn what our God is like. Thomas Long commenting on the Christmas reading from Hebrews compares Christmas to a man he knew who lost his father when he was an infant. While other boys worked alongside their fathers in the fields or played catch or went fishing together this man had no memories of his father. So he diligently searched out people who had known his father, a schoolteacher when his father was a boy, a retired pastor at his father's church, and an aging cousin of his father. He would urgently ask them." What can you tell me about my father?

In a very real way our spiritual quest is a hunger to know our heavenly parent the one who gave us birth. And because of Christmas when we look upon Jesus our heavenly parent is revealed. As John Calvin put it, "The Father however infinite, becomes finite in the Son. He shows himself only in the Son- as though he says here I am, contemplate me."

John Secker from the Diocese, the name Conrad David came up. Marg Mowat from St. Johns stated that he was buried in the most remote corner of St. John's cemetery and wondered why considering that he was a very important man back in the day. Conrad David gave land that now has St. John's church erected on it. This took place in 1830 and the original bond that was signed with the Diocese of Quebec is in the Archives at Kingston.

The David House that majestically sits above the church now houses the Waupoos Cider business. The first church services in Marysburgh were held in this house. In the fall of 1784, a band of recently discharged Hessian soldiers under the leadership of Baron de Reitzenstein came to Marysburgh to take up land that was granted them for their loyalty supporting the British Army in the American Revolution. The surveyor

Collins from Kingston had just surveyed North Marysburgh and divided the land into 200 acre lots, Bayside and lakeside giving each lot water frontage and therefore access to the only means of transportation available at the time.

One of the German soldier/pioneers was Henry David and his wife Elizabeth Keiza, daughter of the Duke of Hesse. Some of the more affluent soldiers brought their wives to America with them in 1778 when they fought the American rebels. Henry and his fellow Prussians were not treated as equal to the other Loyalists that arrived at the same time under Captain Archibald McDonnell. In fact the Germans were forced to pay 5£ for their lots. This did not sit well with many of them and a few picked up and left for Germany, some leaving their wives and children behind. One such person was Henry David. He died at sea on his way home. His wife and son Conrad David were left on their own to survive the hardships of pioneering in North Marysburgh in the late 1770s.

Conrad, their only son, married Mary Cole in 1811 and raised 9 children. One of them was named Peter born in 1815. He married twice and he and his second wife Sarah Clapp had 7 children: Dr. Egerton, Philip Conrad, John, Ellen, Lavanta, Cynthia and Maude. Conrad, Lavanta, Cynthia and Maude Uretta, never married. Cynthia died in 1944 in Toronto and left \$1500 to St. John's in memory of her sister Maude Uretta and \$1500 to St. Philips in memory of her brother Philip Conrad. A copy of her

Will is in the Archives at the Diocese. Her Will states: "to set aside the sum of Fifteen hundred dollars of the aforesaid sum and to pay the income derived therefrom towards the salary of the clergyman stationed at the church..."
